Procedures for Public Comments During Board Meetings

The Board of Trustees of the Richardson Independent School District welcomes members of the public to its meetings. The Board offers a Public Comment Section during its meetings to provide opportunities for members of the public to convey information to the Board.

The Board adopted the following procedures concerning public comments to facilitate the efficient operation of meetings:

Public Comment Section.

- The Board of Trustees will include a Public Comment Section on the posted Agenda for each meeting. The Board holds regular monthly business meetings each month of the year, excluding July. Business meetings typically are scheduled for the first Monday of the month. The Board schedules work sessions to address topics of study or as other needs arise. The Board reserves the third Monday of each month for work sessions, but they also may be scheduled at any other time when a need arises. The Board reserves the right to schedule or reschedule meetings as necessary to meet the operational needs of the District. A written Agenda is posted for each Board meeting at least 72 hours before the meeting is scheduled. If an Emergency Meeting is authorized, an agenda will be posted at least one hour before the meeting is scheduled. .
- The Public Comment Section ordinarily will be called just prior to the first business item on the Agenda.
- When necessary for effective meeting management, to accommodate large numbers of individuals wishing to address the Board at a meeting, or when otherwise advisable to accommodate specific circumstances, the Board delegates to the presiding officer the authority to make adjustments to these public comment procedures. Such adjustments may include, without limitation, adjusting when public comment will occur during a meeting, reordering agenda items, deferring public comment on nonagenda items, continuing an agenda item to a later meeting, temporarily revising public comment procedures as necessary due to the need to hold a videoconference meeting, providing expanded opportunity for public comment, or establishing an overall time limit for public comments and adjusting the time allotted to each speaker.
- Special Considerations for Public Comments During the Pandemic. While RISD continues to offer virtual instruction for students, the Board of Trustees will offer the public the opportunity to submit public comments in writing in advance of each regular business meeting to avoid the need to attend the public meeting. An employee will read the comments during the public comment section. Written comments may be submitted to the Reception Desk at 400 South Greenville Avenue, Richardson, Texas 75081 between 3:30 and 4:30 p.m. on the day of the scheduled regular business meeting. Speakers must submit their own cards. RISD will not accept multiple cards from one speaker. RISD will not accept written comment safter 4:30 p.m. A staff member will read the timely submitted written statements during the Public Comment section of the meeting. RISD will not read comments submitted anonymously. A link to the Public Comment Card will be included with the posted Agenda. All other requirements in these procedures apply to written comments.

Speaker Topics.

- Regular Business Meetings. Speakers may comment on specific Agenda items as well as matters not on the posted Agenda during the Public Comment Section at regular business meetings.
- Work Sessions or Other Called Meetings. Speakers may comment only on specific agenda items during the Public Comment Section at work sessions and other called meetings.

Public Comment Cards.

- Persons wishing to address the Board must complete a Public Comment card. Public Comment cards are located in the foyer of the Auditorium in the Administration Building before scheduled meetings. (If the Board schedules a meeting at another location, Public Comment cards will be available in a conspicuous location at the meeting site.) A staff member typically will be present to receive Public Comment cards.
- Completed cards must be placed in the designated box no later than the posted time for the meeting to begin, usually 6:00 p.m. RISD will not accept Public Comment cards after the Board President calls the meeting to order. In addition to identifying information, each speaker must indicate the specific agenda item about which he or she wishes to comment and/or identify the non-Agenda topic of the comments.

• <u>Written Materials</u>. A speaker who wishes to provide written materials to the Board of Trustees must attach at least nine (9) copies of the materials to the completed Public Comment card. Staff will provide a copy of the materials to the trustees before the speaker is called. The speaker may not distribute materials when he or she is called to speak.

<u>Time</u>.

- Each speaker is limited to a total of three* minutes and a speaker may not use time of another speaker to extend his or her comment period. *Note:* A speaker who addresses the Board through a translator will have six* minutes to present comments to ensure that non-English speakers receive the same opportunity to address the Board.
- Staff will set a three*-minute digital timer for each speaker. The speaker shall end his or her comments when the timer expires. Any speaker who fails to stop speaking and yield the podium at the end of his or her allotted time is considered out of order and may be escorted from the podium and/or asked to leave the meeting.
 (Unless the comment period has been limited as provided herein.)
- Single comment. A speaker may complete one Public Comment Card for each meeting.
- Protocol for Speakers.
 - The Board Secretary will call the name of each speaker who has submitted a public comment card and state the topic(s) on which the individual has registered to speak.
 - Each speaker should approach the podium when his or her name is called. An adjustable microphone is affixed to the podium in the Auditorium. The speaker should clearly state his or her name and the school or school(s) the speaker's children attend or have attended before beginning to comment.

- The Board will not engage in dialogue with a speaker. Specific factual information or reference to an existing policy may be furnished in response to inquiries or statements. The Board cannot deliberate or make a decision on any subject that is not on the Agenda.
- The public comment period is not the appropriate forum for presentation of formal complaints. RISD maintains a formal grievance policy to address complaints. The Board will only consider complaints that remain unresolved after they have been addressed through proper administrative channels and when they have been placed on the Agenda.
- Remarks or other conduct that disrupt the meeting are considered out of order and will not be allowed.

• <u>Consent for Online Publication</u>. RISD may audio and video record its meetings. A person who chooses to speak during the Public Comment Section is consenting to the online audio/video publication of his or her comments.

INFORMATION ITEM

TOPIC: Student Performance Board Goals: CCMR Update

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

House Bill 3 (HB 3) amends Texas Education Code (TEC) to add Sec. 11.185 and 11.186 to include plans that target early childhood (EC) literacy and math proficiency and college, career, and military readiness (CCMR).

Goal 3: CCMR indicator score for all students will increase from 65% to 79% by June 2024.

Equity Goal: Percent of AA students meeting the CCMR indicator will increase from 56% to 73% and Percent of Hispanic students meeting the CCMR indicator will increase from 53% to 70% by June 2024. (Opportunity gap closes in 5 years from 26%-18% for AA and 29-21% in Hispanic)

Goal Progress Measure 3.1: Percent of graduates meeting college-ready in Reading and Math will increase from 48% to 67% by June 2024.

Goal Progress Measure 3.2: Percent of graduates who earn 9 or more college credit hours through dual-credit and/or OnRamps courses will increase from 11% to 15% by June 2024. **Goal Progress Measure 3.3**: Percent of students taking an AP course earning a 3 or higher on an AP exam will increase from 30% to 45% by June 2024.

Tonight, the Board will be provided an update on the progress made for Goal 3 of the Board Student Performance Goals. The update will include an overview of the progress being made in Advanced Placement, dual-credit, CTE and other CCMR strategies to support this goal.

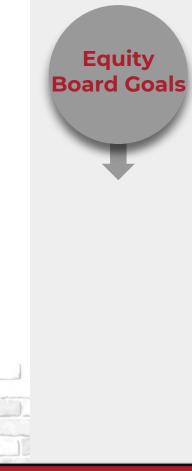

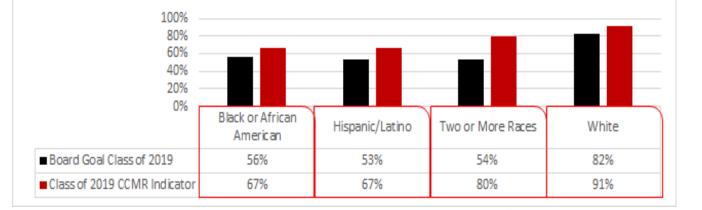

Property Values

Local Property Value

- Used for calculating tax bills
- Drives tax collections
- Determined by the Dallas Central Appraisal District

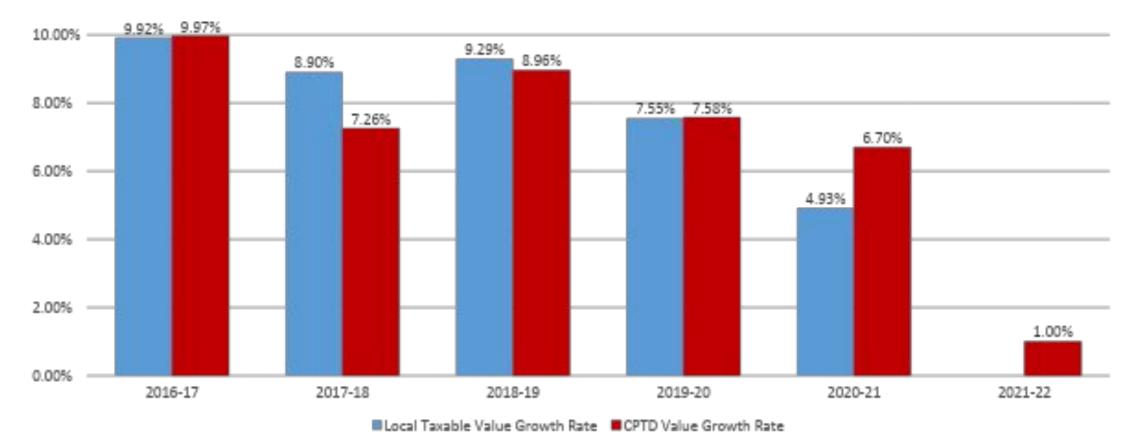
Key Points:

- Do not move at the same rate
- Both are estimates at the time of budget adoption

Comptroller Property Tax Division (CPTD) Value

- Determined by Comptroller Property Tax Division
- Used in determining if a district pays recapture - Chapter 48 or 49 (was 41) status
- Districts can appeal
- Property value that changed from prior year to current year under HB3
- Provides 4 values for M&O and 4 for I&S in State Funding Formula
- August 2021 receive final value for tax year 2020 = fiscal year 2020-2021

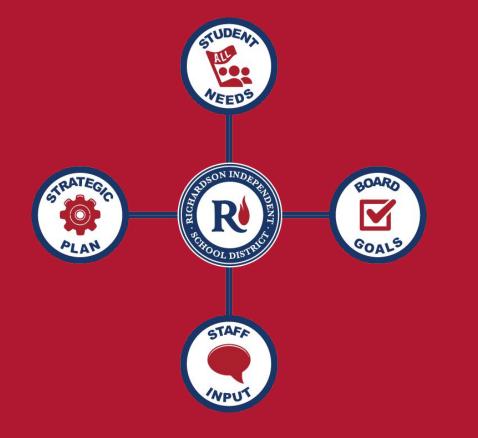
Property Growth Value History

Bond Related Board Actions

Board Actions Upon Bond Passage

- Reimbursement Resolution
- Parameter Order for Refunding Bonds
- Parameter Order for New Money Bonds
- Intent to Defease Certain Outstanding Bonds

Reimbursement Resolution

- Allowed the District to reimburse itself from bond proceeds for bond expenditures made prior to the issuance of bonds.
- Don't have to wait on bond sale to start projects.
- Necessary for the District to reimburse itself for hard costs (purchase of tangible items and payments for construction)
- Reimbursement for soft costs (architects and engineers) does not require a reimbursement resolution.

Parameter Bond Orders

Flexibility & Market Timing – Bond issue is in "Day to Day" mode meaning that bonds can be priced at any time and in an interest rate environment that is hopefully the most advantageous to RISD rather than being locked into pricing on the date of a Board meeting.

NOTE: RISD has utilized Parameter Authority on all new money and refunding bonds issued over the last 16+ years.

Parameter Order for Refunding Bonds

- Allowed under §1207 of Texas Government Code
- Board delegates final pricing authority to Board selected Pricing Officers
- Board establishes and approves bond sale parameters with Parameter Refunding Order
 - Maximum Principal Amount
 - Minimum Savings Threshold
 - Maximum Interest Rate
 - Final Maturity Date
 - Expiration of Delegated Authority
 - Pricing Officers can only approve sale if Board parameters are met

Parameter Order for New Money Bonds

- Allowed under §1371 of Texas Government Code
- Board delegates final pricing authority to Board selected Pricing Officers
- Board establishes and approves bond sale parameters with Parameter Order
 - Maximum Principal Amount
 - Maximum Interest Rate
 - Final Maturity Date
 - Expiration of Delegated Authority
 - Pricing Officers can only approve sale if Board parameters are met

Intent to Defease Certain Bonds

- Declares Board intent to defease bonds
 - Limited to bonds callable in specified period

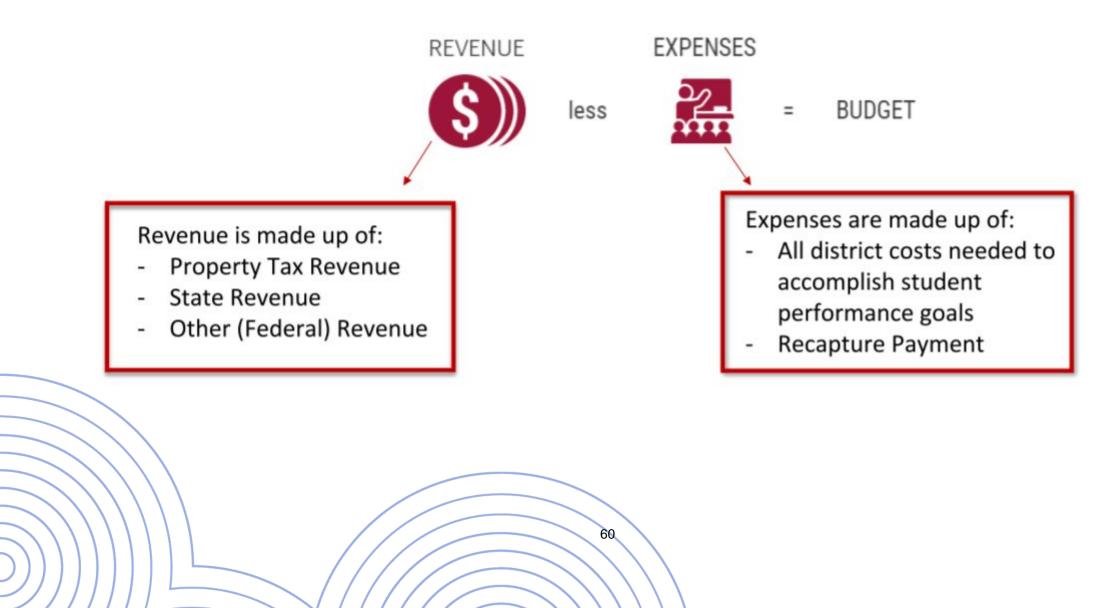
- Lists specific bond issues and amounts
- Helps in Debt Service Fund budgeting process
- Defeasance not required

What are ESSER Funds?

• ESSER stands for Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund

 ESSER funds are awarded to State Education Agencies (SEAs) to be distributed to Local Education Agencies (LEAs)

There are 3 ESSER Funds

- ESSER 1 (CARES) allowable use of funds related to preventing and responding to Covid-19
- ESSER 2 (CRSSA) allowable use of funds the same as CARES, but adds addressing learning loss, air quality, et al.
- ESSER 3 (ARP) stipulates 20% of funds must address learning loss
 social, emotional and academic needs and disproportionate impact of C-19 on underrepresented groups

ESSER FUNDS STATUS

• ESSER 1 - \$1.2 B to State Agency

• Status: Funds were supplanted by the state to cover last six weeks when schools were closed by Governor's executive order and districts were providing remote instruction.



• ESSER 2 - \$5.5B to State Agency

• Estimated to RISD: \$10-\$20M

Status: Texas is seeking a waiver; outcome unknown



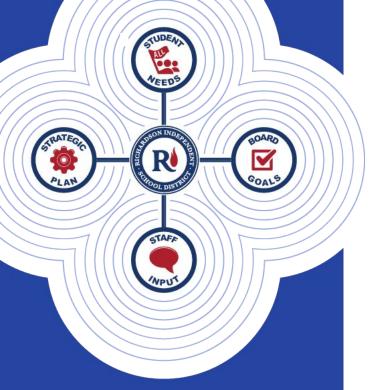
- ESSER 3 \$12B to State Agency
- Estimated to RISD: \$30-\$50M

• **Status:** Outcome unknown, but expected to flow to fund LEA's Academic Acceleration Plans
